The EVx platform is a six-arm crane tower designed to be charged by grid-scale renewable energy. It lifts large bricks using electric motors, thereby creating gravitational ...

They're 2.4 times denser than water and about the same as concrete. Energy Vault's first large-scale gravity-based energy storage system in Rudong, China, is hundreds of feet tall.

Storworks has constructed a 10MWhe, first of its kind concrete energy storage demonstration facility at Southern Company's Gaston coal-fired generating plant. The project was funded by the DOE, EPRI (Electric Power Research Institute), and other industry partners to prove the performance of Storworks' BolderBloc technology.

Concrete's robust thermal stability, as highlighted by Khaliq & Waheed [5] and Malik et al. [6], positions it as a reliable long-term medium for Thermal Energy Storage (TES). This stability ensures the integrity of concrete-based TES systems over extended periods, contributing to overall efficiency and reliability.

This investment follows a previously announced technology partnership with CEMEX to provide concrete and other composite material technology for Energy Vault's storage towers. Energy Vault's breakthrough technology was inspired by pumped hydro plants that rely on the power of gravity and the movement of water to store and discharge electricity.
