Aerodynamic drag and bearing friction are the main sources of standby losses in the flywheel rotor part of a flywheel energy storage system (FESS). The main components of a flywheel energy storage system are a rotor, an electrical motor/generator, bearings, a PCS (bi-directional converter), a vacuum pump, and a vacuum chamber . During charging, the rotor is accelerated to a high speed using the electrical motor.

The application of flywheel energy storage systems in a rotating system comes with several challenges. As explained earlier, the rotor for such a flywheel should be built from a material with high specific strength in order to attain excellent specific energy.

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
