

Hot water energy storage in thermal power plants

Thermal energy storage (TES) systems store heat or cold for later use and are classified into sensible heat storage, latent heat storage, and thermochemical heat storage. Sensible heat storage systems raise the temperature of a material to store heat. Latent heat storage systems use PCMs to store heat through melting or solidifying.

In this study, a mathematical model of a combined heat and power unit with a hot water storage tank is developed. The control model for a combined heat and power plant with a hot water storage tank is established. Finally, a control system was designed to enhance the flexibility of the coal-fired power plant. The thermal energy storage system is integrated into the power plant in order to reduce the minimal load operation of the auxiliary boilers. The fully charged storage can assume standby operation, which was to-date the operation in the minimal load of an auxiliary boiler.
