You may be prescribed in tablet form: Tolterodine, Trospium, Oxybutinin, Solifenacin, Darifenacin or Fesoterodine.

Short-term antibiotics do not work and urine tests do not show an infection. This might mean you have a chronic (long-term) UTI. This can be caused by bacteria entering the lining of the bladder. Because urine tests do not always pick up the infection and the symptoms can be similar to other conditions, chronic UTIs can be hard to diagnose.

If your urinary system is healthy, your bladder can hold up to 16 ounces (2 cups) of urine comfortably for 2 to 5 hours. You may have problems with urination if you have: Some conditions may also cause you to have blood or protein in your urine. If you have a urinary problem, see your health care provider.

How it all works together. Filtering: Your kidneys filter your blood, capturing waste and turning it into urine.; Transporting: Urine travels from your kidneys through the ureters to your bladder.; Storing: Your bladder holds the urine until you"re ready to go to the bathroom.; Exiting: When you urinate, the bladder contracts, and urine exits through the urethra.

Your bladder is the organ in your pelvis that stores urine (wee). Your bladder can hold about 500ml of urine, but most people feel the need to urinate (do a wee) when it's holding around 200-300ml. Most people empty their bladder 4 to 6 times a day.

The digital equipment healthcare providers use in this test can measure urine flow and pressure in your bladder and rectum by using X-rays. The equipment takes images of your bladder during filling and emptying.

It's best to hand your urine sample in within one hour. If you can't do that then store it in a fridge until you can take it in - this is to avoid bacteria in the sample multiplying, which can affect results. Make sure your urine sample is stored in a sealed plastic bag in your fridge at around 4C (39F) for no longer than 24 hours.

It might not feel like it, but the adult bladder can hold as much as half a litre (2 cups) of pee before you"ll feel the need to "go". Your body knows how much is in there because your bladder wall is filled with tiny receptors that send a message to your brain when the bladder reaches capacity.

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The urinary system consists of the kidneys, ureters, urinary bladder, and urethra.
