Storage of electrical energy is a key technology for a future climate-neutral energy supply with volatile photovoltaic and wind generation. Besides the well-known technologies of pumped hydro, power-to-gas-to-power and batteries, the contribution of thermal energy storage is rather unknown.

The thermal energy storage method used at solar-thermal electric power plants is known as sensible heat storage, in which heat is stored in liquid or solid materials. Two other types of TES are latent heat storage and thermochemical storage.

Several sensible thermal energy storage technologies have been tested and implemented since 1985. These include the two-tank direct system, two-tank indirect system, and single-tank thermocline system. Solar thermal energy in this system is stored in the same fluid used to collect it.
