Thermal energy storage (TES) using PCMs (phase change materials) provide a new direction to renewable energy harvesting technologies, particularly, for the continuous operation of the solar-biomass thermal energy systems. Latent heat storage has allured great attention because it provides the potential to achieve energy savings and effective utilization [[1], [2], [3]]. The latent heat storage is also known as phase change heat storage, which is accomplished by absorbing and releasing thermal energy during phase transition.

The research, design, and development (RD& D) for phase change materials have attracted great interest for both heating and cooling applications due to their considerable environmental-friendly nature and capability of storing a large amount of thermal energy in small volumes as widely studied through experiments [7, 8].
