The heat or energy storage can be calculated as. $q = V r c_p \Delta T = m c_p \Delta T$ (1) where . q = sensible heat stored in the material (J, Btu) V = volume of substance (m^3 , ft^3) r = density of substance (kg/m^3 , lb/ft^3) m = mass of substance (kg, lb)

Energy can also be stored by making fuels such as hydrogen, which can be burned when energy is most needed. Pumped hydroelectricity, the most common form of large-scale energy storage, uses excess energy to pump water uphill, then releases the water later to turn a turbine and make electricity.
