In general, Organic phase change energy storage materials have many advantages, such as thermal and chemical properties are relatively stable, high enthalpy of phase change, no phase separation and supercooling, non-toxic, low cost, etc.

Latent heat is measured in units of J/kg. Both L_f and L_v depend on the substance, particularly on the strength of its molecular forces as noted earlier. L_f and L_v are collectively called latent heat coefficients. They are latent, or hidden, because in phase changes, energy enters or leaves a system without causing a temperature change in the system; so, in effect, the energy is hidden.

PCMs have the potential to store thermal energy, during phase change, ... [65] heat transfer problems during the solidification and melting process can be simulated using FLUENT software. Energy Changes That Accompany Phase Changes. Phase changes are always accompanied by a change in the energy of a system. For example, converting a liquid, in which the molecules are close together, to a gas, in which the molecules are, on average, far apart, requires an input of energy (heat) to give the molecules enough kinetic energy to allow them to overcome the ...

PCMs absorb and release thermal energy as they transition between solid and liquid states i.e. melting and freezing or crystallisation. (Transitions such as liquid-vapour-liquid also involve large thermal energy changes and are used in e.g. refrigeration circuits where vapour can be controlled.) The key to how they work is the phase change.

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Application of phase change energy storage in new energy: The phase change materials with appropriate phase change temperature should be selected according to the practical application. The heat storage capacity and heat transfer rate of phase change materials should be improved while the volume of phase change materials is controlled.

The global energy transition requires new technologies for efficiently managing and storing renewable energy. In the early 20th century, Stanford Olshansky discovered the phase change storage properties of paraffin, advancing phase change materials (PCMs) technology []. The energy involved in a phase change depends on two major factors: the number and strength of bonds or force pairs. The number of bonds is proportional to the number of molecules and thus to the mass of the sample. The strength of forces depends on the type of molecules.
